- acquiring key riverside properties for conservation purposes



Local stakeholders are working together to mitigate impacts associated with the Cleveland dam on the Capilano River in North Vancouver.

- smolt passage
- improving flow regimes
- resolving downstream temperature differences through dam modification
- enhancing downstream habitat below dam.
